Aunty Dr Doseena Fergie OAM

PhD



Aunty Dr Doseena Fergie is an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Elder descended through Wuthathi, Mabiauag Island and Ambonese ancestry. A proud mother of three adult children and grandmother to four, she has a PhD in nursing research. As a registered nurse and midwife she has worked as an Aboriginal health team's clinical coordinator and lectured in Aboriginal health and culture at the Australian Catholic University (ACU). Currently she is the project lead embedding Indigenous Knowing into the curricula. In 2020 Doseena became an elected ACU Academic Senator. She is the founding member

of several Aboriginal community services in Melbourne. In 2016 she became a Churchill Fellow and the inaugural Fellow of the Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses and Midwives (CATSINaM). Later she was inducted into the CATSINaM Hall of Fame in recognition for her contribution toward Aboriginal health and wellbeing. She was recognised as the Citizen of the Year by the Yarra Ranges Council; inducted into the Victorian Roll of Honour for Women and in 2019 awarded an Order of Australia Medal in recognition for her work in community health.

Professor Kate Drummond

Professor Kate Drummond is Director of Neurosurgery at Royal Melbourne Hospital and Head of CNS Tumours. Her research and clinical interests are in the biology and management of brain tumours. She is Neurosurgery Editor of the Journal of Clinical Neuroscience and Chief Examiner in Neurosurgery for the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons. She is Chair of Pangea Global Health Education, a not-for-profit organisation specialising in health education in low resource settings. In 2019 she was awarded Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for services to medicine, particularly in neuro-oncology.

Dr Ruth Mitchell

Dr Ruth Mitchell is a neurosurgeon-scientist with a keen interest in paediatric neurosurgery and brain tumour biology. She is dedicated to carrying out research to better understand neurosurgical disease and harnessing the tools of structural biology to improve patient outcomes. This has seen Dr Mitchell being awarded numerous grants and scholarships, from foundations such as Cancer

Australia and the Brain Foundation. Currently Dr Mitchell is completing her PhD at the University of Melbourne.

Dr Mitchell is currently a member of the AOA Cultural Inclusion Working Group and deputy chair of the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons Foundation for Surgery. Dr Mitchell spent many years advocating for medical trainees, taking on numerous roles within the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons Trainees' Association. Dr Mitchell has also been awarded a Nobel Peace Prize for the work of the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN).

She is a medical educator and lecturer in Department of Paediatrics at the University of Melbourne. Dr Rhodes is passionate about health literacy and the role of communication and the media in health promotion.

Dr Karen Price

Dr Karen Price was awarded the 2016 RACGP FMCER grant to undertake her part time PhD with the Monash Department of General Practice. She is exploring the construct of peer-connection in general practice. This explores GP's well-being, and goal-directed informal learning.

Karen's research builds on her lifetime expertise as a GP. She is the co-developer and facilitator of GPs Down Under, an 8000+ member community of Australian and New Zealand GPs. She has chaired committees and developed mentor programs for both the AMA and the RACGP. She has also been a successful practice owner growing a languishing practice into a thriving community practice in under a decade whilst child wrangling three young school age children.

Most recently her advocacy, research and lifetime experience have coalesced into running for President of the RACGP after her service as deputy chair of the Victorian Faculty of the RACGP and past chair of the Women in General Practice committee of the RACGP. Karen was successful in a nation-wide election and is currently President-elect taking over the position on November 30, 2020.

Anita is the elected Program Chair of Alzheimer's Association International Society to Advance Alzheimer's Research and Treatment Health Policy Professional Interest Area. She serves on the executive committee of Australian Association of Gerontology Victorian Division, and Chairs a

National Younger Onset Dementia Special Interest Group.

Anita is one of 60 women selected nationally by Science & Technology Australia to be a 2019-2020 Superstar of STEM, and is an alumnae and active faculty member of the Wellbeing team in the Homeward Bound program, a leadership, strategic and science leadership course for women with a background in science.
